Blue-eyed Grass 'Blue Note' Sisyrinchium angustifolium

Sisyrinchium angustifolium, or more commonly called Blue-Eyed Grass 'Blue Note', is a herbaceous perennial (it dies to the ground in the fall and re-emerges in the spring) and a native plant of the Southeast United States. It looks like a grass, but is actually in the iris family. The leaves grow in grass-like clusters forming little mounds that spread up to 12-15 inches tall and wide. Dainty violet-blue flowers bloom in late spring to early summer.



Plant Care: 'Blue Note 'grows best in full sun to partial shade in moist, well-drained soils. Will freely self-seed in optimum growing conditions, but can be sheared after blooming to avoid any unwanted self-seeding and/or to tidy up any foliage. Plants benefit from being divided every few years to remain vigorous.
